From Where I Sit by Rev. Nada B. Sellers, M.Div.

When I began serving as Designated Term Pastor, this newsletter, *The Church Mouse*, was the central communication source for Rocky Hill Church on a monthly basis. Worship information through verbal announcements and a very large amount of information included at the back of each bulletin was being delivered, along with email information, but communication was a growing challenge.

We have come a long way! Remember *"Staying Connected"* during the shut-down months of the COVID-19 pandemic? By my count, I wrote and distributed EIGHTY-FOUR (84) editions between January 2020 and October 2021. With the growth of our use of the email platform called *"Constant Contact,"* an expanded and nimble website, a weekly "e-newsletter" curated by Laura in the office and delivered mid-week, we have been able to deliver news and information in timely and effective ways. There are many people to thank for these improvements; it has been a great team effort.

This issue of *The Mouse* – as we sometimes call it, with affection - takes another step forward in this process: moving to a quarterly issue with a more in-depth focus on topics before the church, presenting a different look through use of different software, and with a "mouse" showing up for intrigue! Your editors, myself included, believe these adjustments will further improve our ability to communicate about things that matter in church life and learning. Let's hear what you think!



Since I began serving Rocky Hill church, 40 months ago, lots and LOTS of things have changed. That was the “before times” as many of us call them, and we were quickly drawn into the necessities of gaining virtual skills and capacity, as well as staying healthy while addressing the sea change of being and doing church without physical contact. In my case, this also included few in-person relationships and within a year, a short-staffed period of almost a year, as Faith Formation sought a part-time Coordinator. Worship innovation blossomed as did our comfort levels with outside events and audio-visual media being integrated into worship settings in the Meeting Houses and Chapin Hall.

And now, in these “aftertimes,” choices are being made that lead away from the path I had hoped to travel as your continuing pastor and teacher. Due to Council’s decision at a special Council meeting, held on January 25th, I have continued my search for my next pastorate. This has led to another call to another church in Connecticut; my resignation is now official, with an announcement made during worship on Sunday the 12th of February. I am negotiating forward with Ruth, our Moderator, and Council leaders to finalize aspects of my departure. My final Sunday will be March 5th, 2023.

The questions about how to flourish as the United Church of Christ in Rocky Hill will remain before you, as they do for many of the congregations in the United Church of Christ and particularly, the southern New England region as we continue to live into a racially new Conference structure. Our time together has included lots of wonderful service in Christ’s name as well as exploration of the possibilities the Spirit is calling Rocky Hill church to. The differences in our congregation are apparent but not insurmountable with God’s help. They will require more communication and grace, and more participation, not less. I hope everyone will be willing to share in a more transparent and credible conversation, and that *The Church Mouse* can be a part of your dialogue. From Paul’s letter to the Corinthian church, I offer the following exhortation (1 Cor. 16:13-14):


**“Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong.


Widening the Circle

VISIONFUND Update

The Council voted in October to recommend to the congregation that we retain the United Church of Christ Capital Campaign Services to assist us in undertaking a capital, (and more), campaign to help underwrite some major facilities improvements as well as some program areas we may want to pursue. This is what they do for churches, and we have been very impressed in our many conversations with them. We are calling this campaign our VISIONFUND campaign, associated with our VISION300 initiative (celebrating our 300th birthday in 2027).

- * This campaign will require a congregational vote, so we hope that you will all try to attend some information sessions to learn more.

Racial Justice Steering Committee

2022 GHIAA Summit:

On December 7, 2022, a small but mighty group from RHCC, attended our first [GHIAA](#) (Greater Hartford Interfaith Action Alliance) Summit at Weaver High School in Hartford.



This event was a culmination of work that began in the Summer of 2022 by the members of over 30 UCC churches, Christian churches, Synagogues, Mosques, and Universalist Churches in the Hartford area, that are seeking justice for the people of Connecticut.

From the Treasurer: Shifting Perspectives

About three months ago, I contemplated drafting an article about what was shaping up to be a very stressful year for us financially. Faith giving, (ongoing sustaining support), seemed to be heading downward when compared to the same period last year, and our Memorial Fund was substantially reduced due to market influences, which many of us can relate to from our personal investments.

However, I never got around to writing that article. And, lo and

Members of these congregations held honest and meaningful conversations with their peers, lay leaders, and pastoral leadership to identify issues that “kept them up at night.” The problems that had been identified over those months were presented during the Summit to the member congregations and political leadership from the Hartford region, with the hopes of obtaining a promise of collaboration to help find solutions and resolve injustices experienced by marginalized people in our state.

It was a deeply spiritual and powerful moment for me to stand in front of over 700 people and share that Rocky Hill Congregational Church was now a GHIAA member and that our church would work with the other congregations of GHIAA to fight for justice in Connecticut. Our Racial Justice Committee and Core Team have spent countless hours deepening our understanding of racism and how we can work as allies to address racist systems that impair the ability of our BIPOC and marginalized siblings to live in freedom.

The areas identified were:

Mental Health:

GHIAA will partner with [HUSKY 4 Immigrants](#) to expand health care coverage for adolescents regardless of immigration status.

GHIAA will join forces with [NAMI-CT](#) and [CT Keep the Promise Coalition](#) to call for peer-run respite and community-based support for those experiencing a mental health crisis.

GHIAA will engage congregations to build infrastructure for supporting mental health at the community and congregational levels.

Environmental Racism:

GHIAA will fight for the remaining MIRA funds to be allocated towards proper remediation of the trash-to-energy plant in the South End of Hartford.

Educational Equity:

In a state where 50% of K-12 students are individuals of color, Connecticut spends \$720 million more to educate school districts that are 75% white students than they do on school districts that are at least 25% students of color. GHIAA will demand funding equity for Connecticut in partnership with [Faith Acts for Education](#) and [CONNECT](#).

Housing and Homelessness:

GHIAA will join with [Open Communities Alliance](#) to fight for zoning reform for affordable housing.

Fight for a rent cap to curb predatory rent hikes that increase housing insecurity across the state.

Call on area towns to increase funding and support for homelessness, which now falls mainly on Hartford.

Gun Violence:

GHIAA will fight for increased resources for organizations working directly toward gun violence prevention in urban areas.

We will have the opportunity to participate in these legislative actions in the coming months. Please watch for updates via weekly newsletter, bulletins, emails, and the Church Mouse.

As we continue on our journey to becoming an anti-racist church and freeing ourselves from the burden of racism that impacts all of us, I ask that you pray for the Racial Justice Committee and those involved in the GHIAA Core Team. When I looked out on the crowd of

behold, the picture today is improving! Our sustaining giving is actually up about 5% over the same 8 month period, (May 1 – Dec 31), in the prior fiscal year, and the financial markets seem to be consolidating with a better outlook.

Even so, as the trends may be turning, the glass is still only half-full. We continue to have longer term worries about the amount of our Memorial Fund that we are spending annually, because of our budget shortfalls. Moreover, inflationary pressures are impacting just about all of our costs. We need to expand our revenues just to maintain the status quo.

Many give generously. During the first two years of the pandemic, while many other churches were reducing staff and other expenses, we were able to carry on, due to your level of giving. And our ministries have been growing!

As we continue to give generously to our MAG (Monthly Abundance Gift) recipients, our ongoing sustaining support could use a bit of an inflationary boost. After all, this basic giving provides the foundation for all that we do as a church.

We will soon need to develop a budget for the upcoming fiscal year. It will be a challenge! While we have started down some paths toward expanding our revenues in non-traditional ways, (e.g., through grants, rental income, etc.), those efforts will take time to bear fruit.

So when you consider how much you can provide in support of RHCC’s ministries in the next year, know that all gifts continue to be vital as we endeavor to become the church that we aspire to be...and that we are called to be.


Notes from Facilities

Facilities has had a busy winter so far. To date:

*We've been working with a commercial Realtor to rent a section of the 2nd floor. We have a signed agreement to rent two "suites" on the second (top) floor of the building. To date, only a couple of entities

owned, **CPR Training Professionals** and will cover adult, child, and infant CPR training, AED usage, and choking remediation.

Congregational Care

As was proposed by several members, recent Sunday bulletins have revived the printing of Joys and Concerns from the previous Sunday. The thought is to have each request appear for just one week unless it is an ongoing condition or has significant

updates. We have also expressed interest in the space. We have also contacted a couple of contractors about the cost of room modifications, which may be required.

* We have standardized our rental agreements to ensure consistency with folks who use our building. Thank you to Laura in the office to putting this together for us, and for monitoring our agreements.

* Our Digital Ministry Team has been working to improve our audio visual capability for the Sanctuary and Chapin Hall. This includes ongoing tweaks to our current system, as well as looking to additional improvements. Recently, we've had to replace our failing Sanctuary TV. Fortunately, it was still under warranty. We engaged with the conference's "Digital Ministry" to review our setup for Zoom interactive services. The Digital Minister visited our facility and reviewed our interactive worship equipment and process, and was impressed with our progress. He made suggestions on additions we might make for the Sanctuary, and new equipment in Chapin Hall for summer worship.

* Just like our members are facing at home, we are facing significantly higher heating and electric bills this year. We are working with our vendors to save costs. On the heating side, we are working with the contractor who licenses our heating management program to ensure that we are optimizing our scheduling of heat. We are also working with the contractor that installed our boilers on maintenance to ensure that they are operating at top efficiency and last as long as possible before needing replacement. On the electrical side, we are making efficiency improvements, replacing incandescent light bulbs with LED bulbs, and recently we replaced light switches in the bathrooms with motion sensing switches. Because of Eversource's recent announcement of higher rates, we are investigating alternate electric suppliers for the short term and solar power for the long term.

* We have started a conversation with our architect on putting our Steeple restoration project out for bid. The State Historic Office approved our application for 50% reimbursement for renovating and repairing our Steeple. Estimated cost for the project is \$130,000. The terms of the grant require us to pay all costs up front with reimbursement from the State to us on project completion. We need to sign a contract with the architect to prepare bid documents, and to bid the project. Once bids are in, we will need to have a Congregational vote to fund the project. It is hoped work would start in the spring or early summer.

* We have begun replacing security cameras as they have entered the end of life support by the vendor. We received a notice from the vendor, (Arlo), that they will no longer support the cameras after April of this year. We will be in the process of slowly replacing cameras over the next few months.

* As with the security cameras, changes in technology have forced us to update the cellular dialer for our fire alarm system. The old dialer was no longer supported as 3G cellular frequency has been dropped nationwide.

A Word from the Generosity Team

Truly, because of you, our church changes lives! We hope to show you many examples of this as the

Rocky Hill Congregational Church



Established in 1797, Rocky Hill Congregational is the oldest church in town, dating back to the Colonial Era, when Rocky Hill was part of Wethersfield's Second Parish. Congregationalism was the official religion of the Connecticut Colony until the separation of church and state in 1818. The current meeting house, shown here in 1999, was built in 1868 on land purchased from the Robbins family, replacing an earlier meeting house in the vicinity of the current police station.

The church bell, installed in 1816, was an important element of village life and still tolls from the church tower today. It tolled every day at noon and 9 p.m. and was also used to announce fires and deaths. For some years, it signaled the start of 4th of July celebrations. But several times it occasionally enjoyed breaking into the church and ringing the bell in the middle of the night, so this practice was ended in 1896.

The meeting house is a prototypical 19th century New England Congregational style church. The quality of exterior detail, with its Palladian windows, fluted columns, dentil moldings, and classical balustrades under foundation, was an important determinant in its placement on the National Register of Historic Places in 1975. The three-story tower once had a spire with a large gilded ball. But that spire was taken down after it was damaged by wind and was replaced in 1843 with this clock tower.



Built between 1848 and 1852, a parish house expansion added classrooms, meeting rooms, offices, a parlor, and a small chapel. It also provided space to become a parsonage, which was originally Rocky Hill's first kindergarten and has served an important need to this day. This photo shows just the first floor of that addition completed. A later 1993 expansion added several new classrooms and an elevator, making the building more accessible.



One of the church's most renowned pastors was Calvin Chapin, who served for 63 years until his death in 1922. His was prominent in forming the Connecticut Bible Society in 1816 and the American Board of Foreign Missions.



In 1922, a serious fire in a stove behind the meeting house damaged the back of the church and destroyed several other buildings. Local men formed a bucket brigade until fire departments could arrive. These buildings were never repaired, leaving open land for later church expansion.



A Church for the Future - While proud to be the town's oldest church, Rocky Hill Congregational seeks to be a church of the present and future, striving to meet changing times. The church welcomes all who seek justice, kindness, and love for all people and for creation. No matter who you are, or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here.

Our Signage and Wayfinding Team is currently working with Facilities on some alternatives for updating our other signs and ensuring that our signage and our landscaping is part of a coordinated plan.

ZERO WASTE:


- * Refuse what you don't need. This prevents unwanted items from coming into your home and applies to all those promotional items you're offered, along with things like junk mail and plastic straws.
